NOT A DEDUCTION.

Arizona now allows individuals to donate up to \$400 per person/\$800 per couple, in cash, to Friends of Navajo County Anti Drug Coalition, Inc to help fight youth drug abuse in our community AND get it right back on your Arizona tax return as a **TAX CREDIT!**

- This credit formerly was known as Tax Credit for the Working Poor.
- You don't have to make the maximum Tax Credit donation
- Donations can be made throughout the year, up to the maximum totals and until April 15, 2017.
- The Tax Credit can be made in addition to tax credits for public & private schools and foster care agencies.

Your donations help Friends of the Coalition and NCDP meet its mission to transform community attitudes toward substance abuse. Educational outreach has reduced last 30-day drug use among youth in Show Low and Blue Ridge Schools. (Between 2010 and 2014, underage drinking among Show Low 10 graders declined from 69.5% to 39.5% while prescription drug use among Blue Ridge 12th graders declined from 11.9% to 7.1% of youth surveyed.)¹

How it Works

1. Donate to Friends of the Coalition to prevent youth substance abuse.
2. Use Arizona Department of Revenue Form 32 to claim your credit when you file your state tax return.
3. Deduct your tax credit from the state income tax you owe!!!

Tax Credit vs Deduction

1. Deductions reduce how much income on which you pay tax.
2. Tax Credits reduce the amount of tax you pay on your income! (your money stays on the mountain.
